10:30 a.m. – 11:45 a.m.	Plenary – NAS Committee on Federal Research Regulations & Reporting Requirements Speaker: Harriet Rabb, The Rockefeller University Topic: Concerned that research institutions, faculty, and staff are committing unprecedented time and resources complying with federal regulations and policy, Congress requested that the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine undertake a study of regulations governing research institutions. The study was conducted in two parts with the final report, Optimizing the Nation's Investment in Academic Research: A New Regulatory Framework for the 21st Century, issued in June 2016 . Ms. Rabb, vice chair of the study committee issuing the report, will review the committee's findings and provide an overview of the committee's recommendations which are directed at Congress, federal agencies, and research institutions.
